This work was highly acclaimed in 1992 when it won the Outer Critics Circle Award and the Drama Desk Award for best play, before being turned into the equally acclaimed movie in 1996 featuring Diane Keaton, Meryl Streep and Leonardo DiCaprio.

This comedy classic, written by a contemporary of Shakespeare, centers around the wealthy Volpone, who, having no wife or children, pretends to be dying and, with the help of his wily servant Mosca, eggs on several greedy people, each of whom hopes to be made Volpone's sole heir. Jonson relishes the deceptive powers of language as he weaves an increasingly bizarre and funny tale of greed, avarice and, finally, justice.

Winner of the 1953 Tony Award for Best Play, this exciting drama about the Puritan purge of witchcraft in old Salem is both a gripping historical play and a timely parable of our contemporary society. The story focuses on a noble farmer, his righteous wife, and a young servant girl who maliciously causes the wife's arrest for witchcraft. The whole town becomes engulfed in a pack of lies masquerading as truth. This play has had several revivals and movie adaptations, the most recent starring Daniel Day-Lewis and Winona Ryder.

Subtitled "A Life In Revue," The Will Rogers Follies stands out among musicals because of the magic of its protagonist. Rare is the man who transcends decades and rises to the level of legend. Will Rogers does this not only because of his accomplishments, but because of his philosophy: He truly believed in the goodness of his fellow man. The story unfolds during the performance of the Ziegfeld Follies, which often featured Will Rogers's particular brand of homespun humor and old-fashioned common sense. Songs like "Never Met a Man I Didn't Like" and "Give a Man Enough Rope" are parables set to music. This delightful Broadway hit ran for almost 1,000 performances and captured a whole passel of Tonys including Best Musical of 1991.

Brezhnev's Children

The play is set in a run-down maternity ward on International Women's Day in Moscow, 1985. The era of Brezhnev is fading and a disparate group of new mothers is thrown together to spend ten days in one another's company—they have been quarantined from their babies because of nappy rash. This enforced gathering provides them all with the opportunity to tell their stories to one another. It is funny, moving, and finally a terrific celebration of freedom and the human spirit.

A Lie of the Mind

by Sam Shepard • Dec. 2-5, 2004

Winner of the 1986 New York Drama Critics Circle Award, the Outer Critics Circle Award and the Drama Desk Award, the story involves two desperate families connected by the marriage of the son of one to the daughter of the other. Filled with enormous vitality and humor, the play explores the destinies of these two families, set apart by jealousies and distrust, to probe destructiveness it can engender.

The Swan

by Elizabeth Egloff • March 31-April 3, 2005

During a stormy night in Nebraska, a swan awakens Dora, a young woman with clinging qualities and a streak of bad luck, when he slams into her patio doors. She takes in the wounded bird, and both she and her married boyfriend, Kevin, seem surprisingly unfazed when he transforms into a human. She names him Bill, and attempts to bring out the human qualities of this bird. She discovers that he is deeply in love with her. This causes conflict with the boyfriend and the story escalates into a battle of realities.

Frankie and Johnny in the Clair de Lune

by Terrence McNally • April 26, 28, 30, 2005

This bittersweet comedy combines poignancy and laughter as it traces the unlikely romance that begins to develop between two middle-aged "losers," a waitress and a short-order cook who work in the same restaurant on Manhattan's West Side. She has had more disappointments than delights in life and he is a veteran of one broken marriage already, but from their netimes touching, sometimes hilarious interplay, the promise a relationship beyond a one-night stand emerges.

by Stephen Dietz • April 27, 29 and May 1, 2005
